## “YOU HAVEDONE WHAT ?!!!!”

Some years ago a couple of friends of ours had taken their two little boys, both aged under 5, to the beach near Bournemouth. When they reached home at the end of the day the father looked at little Matthew and realised that something was missing.



“Matthew, where are your glasses?”

“Oh, I buried them in the sand!”

An hour later father and son were back at the beach at the spot where they had earlier spent a pleasant afternoon, armed with plastic spades to search for the glasses (that he hated wearing).

Needless to say, they never re-appeared. Why on earth (or under sand!) would he bury something so essential to him, and the answer to his short-sightedness?

This February, we are going to think about something that God has given to each one of us that call ourselves Christians. Something so precious, so important, so valuable within our lives that we now could not do without it.

It is called **Salvation**.

It’s an old word that we maybe don’ t use and talk about very much, but it is what Jesus won for us on the cross. It means that we are “saved”, and now friends of God rather than being distant or separated from Him.

It means that when we die we will not be banished from God’ s presence but welcomed home to heaven. It means that the power of sin and death is overcome and we do not need to fear them anymore.

During this month of teaching on Sundays it will be a reminder to us of what we have, whilst offering out to others who come to hear, the offer of Salvation. I always think that our Salvation is something that we should publicly display like a medal or brooch. In the way that we are with people, it should cause conversation and questions.

Is yours buried away somewhere?

It' s really important...people need to “see” it and hear about it.

# It Was Worth It.

*An interview with Jenny Saunders*

Jenny is married with two teenage children. She has been worshipping at Hope since 1994 and amongst other roles is one of our Prayer Catalysts.

## **How and when did you first become involved with Hope Baptist?**

Andy and I felt God was calling us to a Baptist Church so Andy trained at a Baptist College. Finding a church is a bit like an arranged marriage; you eye each other up briefly (this is called 'preaching with a view') and if you still want to go ahead you say so. Then you can vote. Hope was unanimous and so were we, which was nice.



## **Where did you live and what did you do before that?**

I have lived in Bristol, London, Leicester, Ireland, Oxford, Kent and Devon!

I got a teaching job near Paignton and while I was working there we got married. When we felt God was calling us to the ministry we went to Dartford in Kent and Andy commuted to Spurgeons. We were there for 4 years and I spent a lot of my time going to toddlers groups with Tim and Katie; I thought it was the best way to get to meet people in the community and build up relationships.

**You have had various different roles and jobs since you have been at Hope – which ones have been particularly exciting or interesting?**

I've been involved with Youth work, Women's Rendezvous, Nurture groups, Alpha groups and Fellowship groups.

Fairly early on I noticed that we had people in charge of money and people in charge of the fabric of the building and lots of other things, but there was no-one looking at prayer and the more noises I made, the more people started looking at me as someone who could do it. I felt quite strongly that it wasn't something I wanted to do on my own and I prayed about it with Gill Knight. She felt the same about it and we became the Prayer Catalysts.

As time has gone on I've begun to realise that my priorities are prayer and evangelism – those are the things that are really on my heart.

I think Parents and Toddlers is the one which has been the most exciting for me, but in quite a drawn out way. You gradually build up relationships and see people become Christians over the years. That has to be one of the best things there is!



**You have recently trained as a Counsellor – how is that going?**

Since my training 3 years ago I've been doing different voluntary work and I still really love it. The more I do the more I want to do. It seems to be a really competitive job market and at the moment I'm not paid. For a while I struggled with that but I'm gradually getting into a place where I can see that

it' s a privilege to be in the position to do it, and it' s the doing it that is the important thing. The struggle is about self-worth. I know in my head that my worth doesn' t come from being paid but emotionally I have to catch up with that. I read a book called ' Choosing Happiness' and in there it talked about how the antidote for resentment is gratitude and I had to deliberately learn to do this. Over a week or two I kept a gratitude diary, writing down all the things I was thankful for and all kinds of things came into it. It gradually began to change my mindset.

### **You are a Prayer Catalyst at Hope – what exactly is that?**

Gill Knight and I gave ourselves the title of Prayer Catalysts to convey the idea that we were fairly invisible, but that things start to happen. Cheryl Williams and I are the Prayer Catalysts now; one of the main things we do is pray – we pray for prayer mainly. Our vision is that every member of the church will be involved in something to do with corporate prayer – prayer triplets or the prayer chain for example.

Some of the ways we want to achieve this is to encourage more people to be on the prayer chain, be part of a prayer group or have a prayer partner. We also want to encourage people in their private prayer. We did some prayer workshops towards the end of last year and are planning some more for this month. We' ll be looking at refreshing, new, creative ways of praying and making prayer accessible.



Just before the summer I was really struggling with the role of prayer catalyst. I was feeling very, very discouraged and

disempowered and that I wasn't doing a very good job of it. Over the summer I really questioned God and said, 'Are you really sure this is something I should be doing?' The feeling that it was a struggle didn't get taken away immediately but I didn't feel that I should stop either. I was reading *Psalms 119* at the time and discovered some of it really echoed how I was feeling. Verse 25 says '*I am laid low in the dust; preserve my life according to your word.*' and then in verse 28 it says '*My soul is weary with sorrow; strengthen me according to your word.*'. The last verse really knocked me between the eyes, '*I run in the path of your commands, for you have set my heart free.*'. So gradually this person has gone from being laid low in the dust to running. I said to God at the beginning of the summer that I want to get to that running place.

From September my misconceptions started to be lifted – two people prayed for Cheryl and me, Andrew (Gardiner) instigated the Big Night of Prayer which lots of people came to, Jonathan Edwards printed an article about being a prayer shaped church and the Deacons wanted to put prayer on the agenda for the church. It feels like being on a big wave of excitement at the moment.

### **We are all being encouraged to pray more at the moment – why do you think we should pray at all?**

Yes, God could quite easily manage without us! The amazing thing for me is that He wants to involve us in what He's doing when He doesn't need to, that He gives us the dignity to share in His work. I'm learning that it's not about us persuading God to do what we want but the God of the Universe graciously sharing His heart with us so that we want what He wants!



I also find there's something about praying together that doesn't happen when you're praying on your own; there's an incredible new dynamic there. The two go together - as you pray on your own it becomes easier to put things into words out loud because you're more confident when you pray on your own and when you pray with people in a group you're more motivated to pray on your own, so the two reinforce each other.

And the other reason I believe prayer is a good idea is because God answers.

### **Have you got any suggestions on how people can pray at home on their own?**

I don't know if other people find this, but there seem to be two different prayer 'levels' for me. The first is the regular daily 'quiet time'. I think with anything of importance like eating or sleeping that I need to have a routine and it's the same with my relationship with God. An appointment with Him seems to happen better for most people at the same time each day. It could happen with an early cup of tea before the day begins or on the journey to work or maybe at the end of the day. Most people read a short passage of the Bible and pray 'tsp' (thanks, sorry, please). A daily 'touching base'.



When I was a toddler mum, my 'appointment' stretched in a fragmented way over several hours due to all the interruptions! I found that if I wrote my prayers in a journal I could keep track of roughly where I'd got to in the conversation.

And I think with any relationship there's the routine organisation, greeting, questions, arrangements etc, but there are also times that are more special, more intimate and relaxed where you talk and listen at another level. I try (and don't always manage) to have a more intimate time with God once a week when I'm not in such a rush and when there's more space to listen to Him and get 'eye contact' as it were.

Even in a quiet place it's hard to get quiet in your head. I think for this different things work for different personality types – some like to curl up with their eyes shut, some prefer to stride across the moors, or use the slight distraction of driving the car to remove the ' chatter' in their heads, or use music, or imagine a conversation with Jesus, or write things down. I suppose it's just a case of trying things out to see what works best. The workshops will be an ideal place to do this.



### **What about if you would like to start praying as a couple or family – how could you go about that?**

We're a pretty bad example! We don't pray as a family and we struggle to pray as a couple. When the children were younger we used to have a bedtime routine with a Bible story and a prayer. Sometimes now we'll pray with Katie and Tim in emergency situations.

Andy and I always thought we wanted to pray together regularly. To our surprise it's been hard. We'll arrange a weekly time slot, keep to it for a while, then suddenly realise weeks have gone by and we haven't been praying. We just have to pick ourselves up and try again (a lot!).

Two of the times that stand out in my mind as being most useful for us have been when we've used someone else's

words. One was at a very difficult Christmas – we lit a candle and read through a service in the Anglican service book and we didn't have to worry about getting the words right, self-consciousness or how we felt. Another time was when we lived in Dartford underneath some very difficult neighbours; all we could do was hold on to each other and read the same Celtic prayer on a regular basis.



So, if you find it easy to pray as a couple or a family I'd love some advice!

I suppose to conclude I'd say prayer isn't always easy but we wouldn't struggle the way we have if we didn't think it was worth it. It is.
