Soul Survivor 2007 - "INTO HIS LIKENESS"

Last August Ron & I took (under sufferance, so we thought) Dom & Jess along with Dave Simpson. Rob Canning, & Katie Smith to Soul Survivor. We ended up having the most amazing & fantastic time of our lives. There was a good mix of worship, teaching and ministry mainly aimed at teenagers but we found there was so much for us too that was life-changing. There is a packed programme of seminars, trendy cafes, sports, movies, skate park. workshops, an artshed, prayer furnace, Mr Boogies nightclub, bookshops, bands & talent events. There was such a buzz about the place and we felt so safe walking around late at night amongst 11,000 wonderful and random young people!

The highlight for us was hearing Brother Andrew speak and the worship. The highlight for the younger ones was the worship times and the bands (and the cake tins!), also the soul sista and soul man seminars (in fact just all of it).

Ron & I practised our newly acquired camping skills but could have brought a caravan or arranged B&B.

The venue is at the Bath & west Showground, Shepton Mallet and we camped in the relatively quieter curfew village.

We did a big shop when we got there from a local Tesco store (we could have eaten more expensively at the numerous cafes or takeaway vans- pizzas, noodles, wraps, waffles etc.) We kept a supply of flapjacks and cakes which seemed to keep our lot happy and they made themselves a packed lunch each day and admirably took it in turns to wash up. We agreed a time to eat together each evening and really enjoyed their company.

We booked our places a few weeks before going but aim to be more organised this year and want to encourage other families to come with us as we thought it was such a great event. If you book before 31st Jan £72,

Upping our standards of giving!

As I write the operating accounts for the church for 2006 have not yet been finalised but indications are that we may have an operating shortfall of up to £8,000. The main reason for this is that we did not achieve the necessary income level from offerings. I also do not yet know if we will have sufficient funds to pay for the building project in full.

It is therefore likely that we will be down to the minimum level of operational reserves by the end of 2006, which means that we really must achieve the income targets for 2007.

I set out below a very abbreviated summary of the 2007 budget. A more detailed analysis was issued at the last members' meeting and copies can be obtained from me:

There is little scope to reduce expenditure if we want to maintain our current levels of ministry. Balancing the finances in 2007 will require giving from regular offerings to increase by approximately 25% over the level of offerings received in 2006.

With the re-vamped building we have a great platform to make a significant impact for Jesus Christ in this community. Including Nutkins pre-school, mums and babies, parents and toddlers, the youth clubs and of course the Sunday youth groups, we regularly have around 200 children and young people into our premises each week. Surely many fellowships would relish such an opportunity to influence so many young people (and their parents) with the Gospel.

In a direct reference to how we use our money, Jesus says in Matthew 6: 19-21

“Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves your treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also”

This is one of those Biblical paradoxes, which paraphrased might read, “if you want to keep your money for ever give it away now into promoting God’ s work on earth” .

If you are relatively new to Hope and would like to partner financially in supporting our work please let me know. Many of us utilise monthly standing order as a way of earthing a regular financial commitment. This is also great for reducing administrative costs. Alternatively I could also issue you with gift envelopes so you can give weekly into the offering taken on Sundays.

If you are a UK taxpayer the church should also be able to reclaim income tax paid under the gift aid scheme. This means an extra 28 pence to the church for every £1 given. I can issue you with a gift aid number if appropriate.

Let’ s invest in things eternal in 2007.

An interview with Kathryn Rundle

Kathryn Rundle is a veterinary nurse. She has been worshipping at Hope since 2000 and leads The Hype for 11 – 14 year olds.

How and when did you first become involved with Hope Baptist?

The first time I became involved with Hope was probably 1995 when my sister was in Plymouth living with John and Judith Pinch and then I went to Spring Harvest with Hope. Also, Hope brought people to the youth camp which my parents ran at the time. When I first moved to Plymouth in 1996, I lived with John and Judith and started going to the Youth Club at Hope. I made some good friends there and started worshipping at Hope in 2000.

Have you enjoyed taking on the leadership of The Hype?

Yes. It's been challenging going from a younger age group up to The Hype. It's something that if you had said to me seven months ago I would be at the end of a term of leading The Hype I would have said, 'No, I don't think so'. There have been a lot of changes in the Youth Leadership teams. The youth have been great though.

In your job as a veterinary nurse are there many other Christians?

No. There is one other Christian, but she works at a different site to me.

Is it difficult being a Christian and working in a non-Christian environment?

Yes it is. I find it quite difficult being a Christian in a non-Christian environment. More so with the staff than the clients, especially when some have very strong opinions about things. We have many discussions about world issues but often my views are very different to theirs because of my faith. I've had a couple of conversations about Christianity with one of the vets, which encourages me.

In 2005 you went on a short term mission to Romania. What happened there and are you still involved with the project?

I went to Romania to work for a charity called International Teams who work mainly with street children and children living in children's homes. It was really a visionary trip because I felt God was leading me into the mission field and still do feel that. Basically I saw the different areas the charity were working in so I had a very varied time – I went to a baby hospital, a children's home, a soup kitchen and also to a little village called Jimbolia where the charity are building a boys' home.

Whilst I was in Jimbolia I found out that the house next to the boys' home was falling down and falling into their garden. As the first week went on I felt that God was placing Jimbolia on my heart during my quiet times. I decided to have a day of

prayer and fasting; God gave me a direct word that I was going to buy the house that was falling down, which shocked me a bit! I spoke to the people running the home about it and prayed about it some more. When I came back to the UK I started to try to raise the funds needed.

God has been very great and has provided that money. I am still in contact with the charity. The house will hopefully be bought in 2007 with a view to knocking it down in the summer which is when I hope to go back.

Do you ever have good times as a Christian?

Yes. The good things about being a Christian and trying to live my life the way God wants me to is knowing that I' m never alone. In one of my quiet times recently I was looking at the word Emmanuel and trying to get to grips with the meaning of that, ' God with us' and it suddenly struck me that I' m never really alone and that is something which has been quite poignant to me this Christmas.

Do you ever have difficult times as a Christian?

Yes. The difficult times are sometimes feeling alone because I live on my own. Sometimes I find things difficult at work because I loved my job but over the last few years I have started to feel that I want to change my career and that God is calling me to something else. It' s difficult knowing that part of my heart is in Romania and I am quite impatient to resolve that.

What or who helps you through those times and do you have a particular bible verse which is important to you?

God!

The things that help in particular are two bible verses:

Philippians 4:13 '*I can do everything through him who gives me strength.*' That verse has always given me strength. The other verse is Romans 12:12 '*Be joyful in hope,patient in affliction, faithful in prayer.*' . This is a verse which God gave me in Romania. These are two verses which I keep coming back to when I am finding things difficult.

I also get help from my fellowship group and particularly from my prayer partner.
