# WHAT' S MORE IMPORTANT TO US— MONEY OR OUR PRAYER LIFE?

*This is a condensed article from the Baptist Times by Jonathan Edwards the new General Secretary of the Baptist Union.*

I am clear about our priority as the Baptist Union of Great Britain. We need to pour our energies into growing prayer-shaped churches.

I long for us to gain more members, have more baptisms, care for people and plant churches – but what' s the point of doing any of those things if we are not growing in prayer? Without prayer we will achieve nothing of any lasting value.

Prayer is a challenge in any age but I believe that it' s particularly challenging today. The pace of our society finds prayer hard to cope with. Prayer doesn' t easily appeal to people who are looking for quick fixes, and that' s the way our society is wired.

The fact is that prayer, like any relationship, is hard work. However, the rewards and blessings, as in any relationship, are extravagant. There is no limit to what God can do when people are truly open to him in prayer.

In this article I want to reflect on your local church and its growth in prayer.

Everything in your church will depend on this prayer journey.

## ***PUTTING PRAYER ON THE AGENDA***

If we accept that prayer is far more important to the spiritual vitality of a church than money, then why is it so rare for us to put prayer on the agenda as a matter for reflection, discussion and decision? Curious.

I suggest that prayer needs to find a place on our agendas. Probably not at every meeting, but ...but perhaps two or three times a year.

This would give everyone the opportunity to take stock and reflect openly together on how prayer is going in the life of the church.

Why not set aside half an hour in which you can ask questions like ...

How has God encouraged us in prayer over recent months?

What has God taught us about prayer recently?

How well are the opportunities for prayer working at the moment?

In what ways can we stimulate new opportunities for prayer?

## ***AFFIRMING PRAYER ENCOURAGERS***

Every Christian knows the importance of prayer. But there is no doubt that some Christians have a special calling to prayer, and the rest of the church desperately needs the encouragement that they can bring.

It is important that such people are clearly recognised within the church. If at all possible, it is good that the person who takes this role is released from other tasks, so that they can give all their energies to their prayer ministry.

## **SEEKING PRAYER OPPORTUNITIES**

When I was young, the weekly prayer meeting in our church was a large and vibrant occasion. Such occasions are no rare, but what has sprung up in its place is variety. Prayer still happens but rather than being focussed on one meeting it is often spread over many smaller and often home based meetings.

I think this is splendid and it is good to see many people actively involved in groups for prayer.

In our fast moving society, it is important for us to keep the times of prayer opportunities under constant review. What time works best for our particular community?

One of the drawbacks of larger gatherings for prayer is that they can be quite intimidating for those who find it more difficult to pray out loud.

Yes, I am sharing my own testimony. As a teenager, I wouldn't have dared to pray out loud in a large church prayer meeting. The use of smaller gatherings for prayer is helpful in enabling people to find their voice.

I am convinced that, if our churches are strong in prayer, we will be led on an adventure which will bring amazing blessings for us and the society in which God has placed us.

So as we prepare for challenge and opportunities of the autumn activities let's make sure that our churches are truly prayer-shaped churches.

## **MARTIN JOHN NICHOLLS**

When I read in the September "Outlook" that Martin John Nicholls had been invited to be the guest speaker at Hope's harvest supper this year, I was determined to go along on 3rd October to see and hear this remarkable man.

I first heard MJN performing on BBC Radio Devon. It was on Christmas morning and Pippa Quelch, the programme presenter, had played a track from Martin's album "Beyond Belief". The song was called "Broken Town" and was based on Martin's experience in Bethlehem and the present state of the birth place of the Son of God. I was so moved by the evocative lyrics that I phoned Radio Devon to ask for more information on the singer. Pippa Quelch kindly phoned me back when she was free and was able to tell me that Martin is a Christian singer/songwriter/musician who also happens to work for Christian Aid. She was also able to give me his web site and telephone number. A few days later I e-mailed him to say how much I had enjoyed listening to him singing "Broken Town" on the radio and that I would like to buy a copy of his album "Beyond Belief". In no time at all he e-mailed me back to thank me for my comments and to give me the information for obtaining a copy of the CD.

His web site is well worth a visit and is most informative. Below are just a few comments that I have lifted from the site.

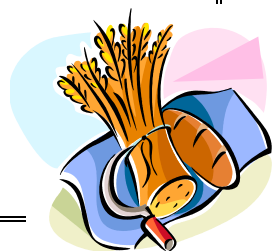

# **Growing in God**

*An interview with Dom Dalton*

Dom Dalton is 16 years old and studying in Year 12 at St Boniface' s College. He lives at home with his parents and sister.

## **How long have you been coming to Hope?**

About 4 years. I' ve been going to church ever since I was young. I went to City Church before we moved to this house.

## **Some teenagers choose to lie in on a Sunday morning, what makes you choose to go to church instead?**

Initially it was habit because my parents took me along every week. I' ve never disliked it in anyway and now I go because I love God. I want to live for Him. I know what it' s like to live for God. I want to grow in faith.

## **What did you do over the summer holidays?**

I' ve been on various Christian youth camps which include Creation Fest and Soul Survivor.

Creation Fest was a large youth event, with Christian bands constantly playing. There was a skate park in the back. It was held in Woolacombe, North Devon.

Soul Survivor is quite like Spring Harvest. It is a youth event which is brilliant for teaching. There were morning and evening meetings which were the best part about it. It was very, very spirit-led, a lot like a Pentecostal service. There were 3 seminars a day. I went to a few

but I wish I' ddone more really. Also, there were skate parks, battle of the bands and a jazz club.

God quite opened me up in Soul Survivor; it really wakened up my faith. Every time I encounter something like this is increases my faith.

I also went on a week away to do a children' s mission for 6-11 year olds in Yorkshire which was brilliant for learning to relate to young children and very good for learning bible passages.

### **How did you get involved in that mission?**

Dawn Getley (area worker for Open Air Campaigners) asked Andrew (Gardiner) if anyone from the church would like to join the mission; she wanted to bring along young people. I was very keen to go on it. I thought it would be a really good experience.

### **You, Rob Canning and Tim Saunders started a Christian Union at school last year; why did you do this and how is it going?**

We saw that all the other schools had Christian Unions but our school didn' t and we felt there should be one. We asked lots of people we knew in Christian Unions in different schools and it just kicked off. We had several meetings beforehand to plan what we would do. We do a reading, discussion, socialise; we try to do what God wants us to do. There' s a quiet room in school that we can use to meet. It' s brilliant, it' s relaxed, it' s got nice seats. We have an RE teacher in there and 6<sup>th</sup> formers as well who do a lot of the leadership. We hold the meetings once per week. We really need prayer for the Christian Union.

## **What is the best thing about being a Christian teenager?**

Knowing you' ve got meaning to life. Definitely. It' s just so good to know, but it' s very humbling as well. It' s really good to know that you can do something with your life and you just don' t fade away when you die.

## **Do you ever have difficult times as a Christian teenager?**

I wouldn' t say I' ve experienced any difficulties other than I would if I weren' t a Christian. The only difficulties I have are sometimes I don' t focus enough on what I' m doing in my Christian life.

## **What or who helps you through those times?**

God gives me a lot of signs. Sometimes I just pray about it and sometimes someone will encourage me to pray. Something like Soul Survivor will come along which really wakes up my senses to what I need to be doing. Most of the time it' s triggered by what God wants.

## **Do you have a particular bible verse which is important to you?**

2 Timothy 3:16,17

' All scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.' – it' s good to know that the Bible is the number one resource for Christians.

Also, John 8:36

' So if the son sets you free, you will be free indeed.'

## The Hope Building Development Project

**Helen:** Well Andrew, you're chairing the BD Committee..how's it going?

**Andrew:** It depends which day you ask me, and how much has happened in the last 48 hours. But, generally speaking it seems to be moving forward without too many hitches....but as at 18<sup>th</sup> Sept the work is 4 weeks behind on schedule. JNE are trying to put more resources in to make up lost time.

**Helen:** Have there been any unexpected problems?

**Andrew:** Some delays with materials when we really needed them & some drainage work that just proved near-impossible. Just trying to keep ahead and plan for each week/month at a time is a real challenge.

**Helen:** *What about the cost of the project..is that under control?*

**Andrew:** At the moment, and with my fingers prayerfully crossed (!) we do not seem to have hit too many things that have created additional expenditure. We have a contingency figure built in to the JNE contract and we are nowhere near reaching that yet. VAT negotiations are ongoing.

**Helen:** **What will the church look like when it's all over? Will the builders clean and tidy before they go, or will it be a terrible mess?**

**Andrew:** I'm sure they will clean up as much as they can. They are actually very tidy, but the mess being made is horrendous, as you might expect from a project like this. We will need to have a major effort together to get everything clean and sorted before it's decorated.

**Helen:** I know you don' t want this question..but when will it be finished?

**Andrew:** Honestly? I cannot say exactly..At one stage I hoped for mid-November, but now it' s looking like early December..if we get any unforeseen delays...??!! When the building work is over we still have redecoration and carpeting to be done. That will not be quick.

## This Month's Committees Feature Presentation

### ***The Buildings Maintenance Committee***

(Not to be confused with the Buildings Development Committee!)

Although buildings maintenance is not at the forefront of excitement in church life, it is an essential part of it. We, as a church, are very blessed to have the buildings we have. Those of you that are home owners will know that building maintenance work never stops in your house and it certainly never stops in a church this size.

The main elements of expenditure this year are:-

- 1 Early in this year there was a problem with the roof on the caretaker's flat and because of the age of the roof we were unable to repair it, therefore the whole roof had to be replaced at a cost of £5,000.
- 2 We have started a programme to replace the windows (not the Sanctuary) with modern UPVc windows. Due to the cost this will take 2 to 4 years depending on available finances.
- 3 The gents' toilet has undergone some refurbishment, which I am sure has been appreciated by the gentlemen in the church. Ladies you could take a quick look, preferably when there is nobody in there!
- 4 The manse is in need of some considerable maintenance and upgrade work, some of which has started this year, but this needs significant effort to bring it back up to standard.

If anybody has any questions about the committee I would be happy to try and answer them.

# **“Stopping Climate Chaos– Developing Countries and the Environmental Crisis”**

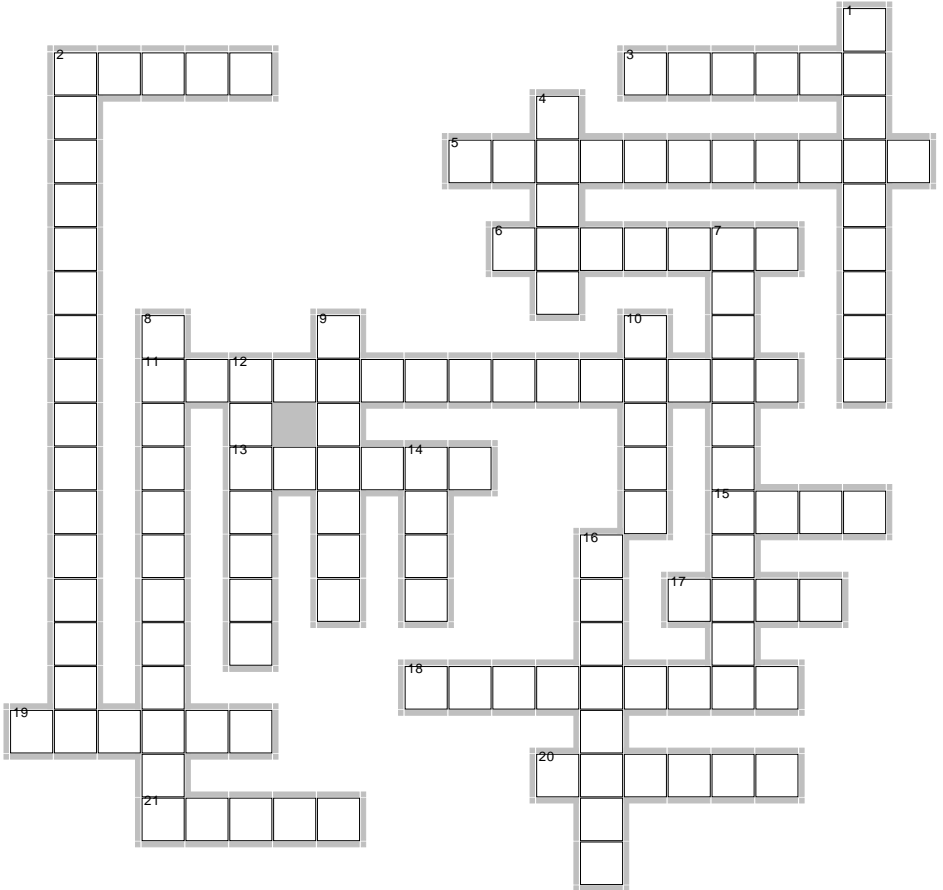
Climate change is now threatening development goals for billions of the world’s poorest people– with a clear danger that recent gains in reducing poverty will be thrown into reverse in coming decades. A staggering 182 million people in sub-Saharan Africa alone could die of disease directly attributable to climate change by the end of the century. Many millions more throughout the world face death and devastation due to climate-induced floods, famine, drought and conflict.

The Christian Aid report 'The climate of poverty: facts, fears and hope' sets out these problems yet also offers the vision of a different future – a revolution in development thinking that could see poor regions using renewable energy to power a new, and clean, era of prosperity.

Andrew Pendleton is one of the authors of ‘ The climate of poverty report, and is currently Christian Aid’s policy manager on climate change. He has been with Christian Aid for six years and has worked on trade, the role of business in development and on how development could be financed beyond aid and debt relief. He is a journalist by profession and spent ten years working for BBC radio, first in Nottingham and then for network in London.

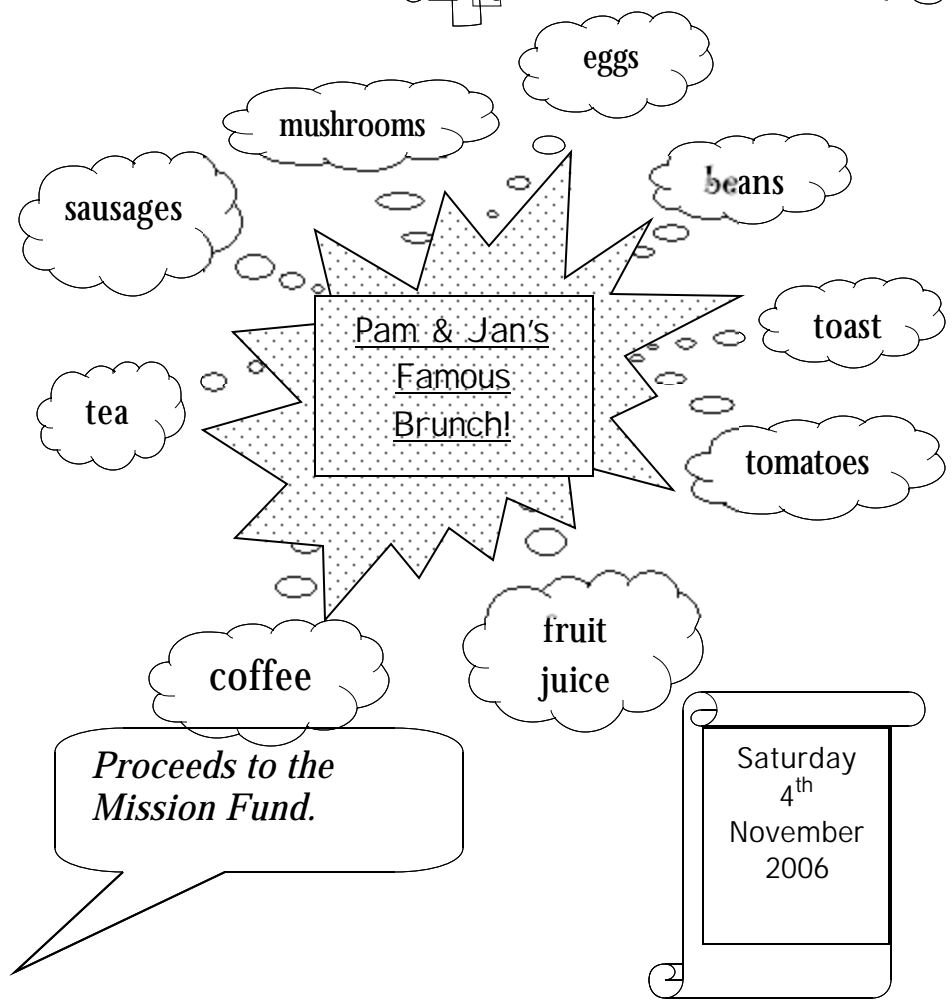
